

THE POWER OF YOUR LIBRARY CARD

Your Long Beach Public Library card is a free ticket to educational and entertainment resources and programs. Although the 12 public libraries are temporarily closed due to the pandemic, many resources are still available to patrons. The Library has made its extensive collection of books and DVDs available for check out through the LBPL To-Go pick up service. Your library card also gives you access to many online resources including eBooks, audiobooks, magazines, movie streaming, music streaming, and a broad array of online classes in databases like Udemy to help you learn something new.

FLC PROGRAM PROVES PANDEMIC PROOF

While patrons are unable to visit the libraries for homework and job search help, that hasn't stopped the Library from providing valuable services. Thanks to your donations, the Long Beach Public Library Foundation funds Brainfuse HelpNow and JobNow as part of the Library's Family Learning

Center program. These online resources provide live one-on-one guidance to students and job seekers. Individualized support is needed now more than ever to help families face the challenges of homeschooling and assist workers as they search for new jobs to get their lives—and livelihoods—back on track.

Brainfuse HelpNow provides a wide variety of online tools for students grades K-12. In addition to live tutoring in English and Spanish, students can access a writing lab, a foreign language lab, virtual study rooms, college application guidance, and a library of lessons, videos, and practice tests. Adult learners can also access live tutoring along with high school equivalency preparation tools, software lessons, and resources to prepare for the US Citizenship test.

Brainfuse JobNow offers live coaching for job searches, applications, résumé development, and interview preparation. A library of lessons, videos, and practice tests give job seekers the opportunity to add new skills to their résumés.



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MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN A STUDENT'S LIFE FOR JUST \$5

Help the Library Foundation reach our goal to give every Long Beach Unified School District 3rd grade student a dictionary/thesaurus of their very own! A \$5 donation purchases a dictionary/ thesaurus for one 3rd grader, \$25 helps five children, and \$150 supports an entire classroom.

According to the Campaign for Grade-Level Reading, students who do not read proficiently by 4th grade are four times more likely to leave high school without a diploma. A dictionary/thesaurus helps students navigate this crucial time, improve their reading comprehension, and succeed in school.

Since 2003, the Long Beach Public Library Foundation and the Earl B. and Loraine H. Miller Foundation have worked together to give new dictionary/thesauruses to more than 120,000 students through the annual Dictionary Days program. For some of these children, this is the first book they have ever owned. Help us make sure that this year's class doesn't miss out on two of the most important educational resources a child can have—a dictionary of their very own and the understanding of how to "look it up" for themselves.

VIRTUAL SUMMER LEARNING

Imagine emerging from this pandemic with a new skill, certificate, or even a diploma. Every summer, the Library offers many learning opportunities to help students and families combat the "summer slide" and continue learning during the break from school. During this recent summer of social distancing, people across Long Beach were looking for ways to continue learning and earn new, marketable job-skills. In the face of the temporary closure of libraries, resourceful librarians and library staff developed creative ways to offer educational programs. The Library Foundation is proud to have supported these programs with your donations.

SUMMER READING PROGRAM



In June, the Library launched its first virtual Summer Reading Program. Hundreds of families signed up to access English and Spanish language resources for readers of all ages, reading recommendations, and daily videos featuring storytimes, science projects, crafts, gardening workshops, and more. Participants tracked their activities in a new, interactive platform to earn points and win rewards.

MAKE.CREATE.DESIGN



To keep teens engaged, the Library's makerspace Studio Guides developed the online Make. Create. Design program for students in grades 7 through 12. Using free design software, students built their own video games from scratch via live virtual workshops on narrative, programming, visual art, and sound design. This exciting program encouraged creativity and taught desirable job skills to participating teens.

DIVE INTO READING



Dive into Reading is the Library's program for families with children who are just discovering the joy of a good book. The program guides parents and guardians as they read 1,000+books to their children before kindergarten and raise life-long readers. On August 29, the program relaunched virtually with a live online bilingual performance for young children, online book trackers for parents and guardians, prizes for reaching reading milestones, and craft kits for pick up.

PROGRAMS FOR ADULTS




Adult learners continue to participate in Library programs designed to help them achieve academic and professional goals. Students in the Library's Career Online High School are progressing in their lessons to earn their accredited high school diplomas and become more competitive candidates in the workforce. The LB Reads program continues to conduct adult literacy tutoring sessions online to support the approximately 1 in 3 Los Angeles County adults who struggle with basic literacy skills.


RACE, EQUITY, AND JUSTICE














As an organization that has long advocated for equity in education and literacy, the Long Beach Public Library Foundation unequivocally affirms that Black lives matter. While we are an organization that relies heavily on the power of the written word, we know words are not enough. In June, the Library Foundation, in partnership with the African American Heritage Society of Long Beach (AAHS-LB), launched a fund for materials and programs related to race, equity, and justice at the Long Beach Public Library.

This fund was conceived when local faith leaders, Reverend Melinda Teter Dodge and Reverend Katy Hyman, contacted the Library Foundation to form a collaboration in support of broad community access to anti-racist educational resources through the library system. As an extension of the Library's African American Resource Collection, supported and curated by AAHS-LB, this fund will support the purchase of new materials including books, eBooks, and audiobooks that promote the voices, narratives, and histories of African Americans. The fund will also support similarly-themed events and activities hosted by the Library. Programs and materials will educate the public on issues such as anti-Black racism, white privilege, white supremacy, mass incarceration, other forms of institutional racism, and human rights issues that have plagued our society.

Thanks to everyone who donated so far, nearly 400 eBooks and audiobooks have been added to the Library's collection including additional licenses for very popular titles, like the books pictured above. In fact, Robin DiAngelo's White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism had an astonishing 248 holds prior to this acquisition. These new additions will ease waitlists and give more people the opportunity to educate themselves about systemic racism.

The Wine Country created a Grape Expectations Read-along Wine









A CHAMPION OF LITERACY

Libraries are critical to the life of a community. It's a vital part of being here. The stronger the library, the better the community.

In January 2019, we mourned the loss of a true champion of literacy and libraries, Richard D. Green. A supporter of the Library Foundation since 2002, Dick's commitment to supporting literacy and education has been proven time and again, throughout his life and in the legacy he leaves behind. This year, the Library Foundation was honored to receive a \$1 million gift from his estate to add to the Richard D. Green Endowed Fund for Literacy which will support programs and resources at the Library for many years to come.

Dick first called Long Beach home in 1935 when his father moved the family to Belmont Heights after being stationed here with the Navy. His family came and went frequently over the coming years, moving to the east coast, then to Honolulu in 1941 and through the start of the War, but returning each time to their Long Beach home. A graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, Dick worked for Chase Manhattan Bank in New York until 1982, when he came back to Long Beach permanently. He became a widely generous advocate for education, literacy, and community restoration supporting California State University, Long Beach; the Long Beach Rescue Mission; Meals on Wheels; Goodwill; the Long Beach Symphony; and of course, the Long Beach Public Library Foundation.


Dick became a member of the Library Foundation's Carnegie49 Society, which honors those who care deeply about the future of Long Beach's public libraries and name the Library Foundation as a beneficiary of their estate. The Society is named for Andrew Carnegie because of his generous work spreading literacy across the country by building libraries from New York to California. Carnegie's library in Long Beach was the 49th Carnegie library in the state. Dick was a regular at the group's annual events, listening to visiting authors, receiving signed copies of their books, and enjoying great food with fellow library supporters. In 2014, Dick made the decision to give during his lifetime the \$1 million gift he had planned, establishing his endowed fund for literacy. The next year, recognizing the pressing need for immediate support for the new Michelle Obama Neighborhood Library, he designated a portion of that gift to the new branch. A plaque in his honor

is on display in that Library's atrium.

In 2017, the Library Foundation awarded Dick the Durnin Family Award at the annual Grape Expectations gala. Dick's compassionate response to the needs of the Long Beach community made him a more than deserving recipient.

While the Library Foundation never suspected that Dick would quietly replace the gift he had already given us with another to be revealed after his passing, this act is a true reflection of his humble and generous character. He will be remembered in the faces of those who will be helped by the Library for generations to come.


